Workshops: Session A

11:00 am—11:40 am

1. **TITLE: A Perfect Match: Libraries and Community Reading Groups**

DESCRIPTION: Many of our library patrons belong to reading groups in the community, but are libraries serving their needs? How can we think outside the box to meet the needs of the exploding reading group phenomenon, at a time when they need the library's services the most? The discussion will cover reading group kits, reading group registration, procurement of titles, and ideas for promoting National Reading Group Month at your library.

PRESENTER: Terry Edwards, Hunterdon County Library. Terry Edwards is a Reference Librarian at Hunterdon County Library. In between patrons' questions, Terry runs the Adult Summer Reading Club, and puts together and promotes "book group kits." Although she does not facilitate the library's reading group, she has been an enthusiastic member of her personal reading group since its inception 10 years ago.

2. **TITLE: All Booked Up: Designing and Running Library Reading Groups for Readers Ages 7-17**

DESCRIPTION: Have the enthusiasm to start a book club for children and teens but don't know where to start? How do you put together a children's book club and how do you measure its success once you've done all the work? Just like readers, books and reading tastes change over a relatively short period of time. The children's discussion will offer insight and advice on making the experience rewarding for you and your readers. The teen discussion will cover how to select titles with high teen appeal, how to create a teen-centric PR campaign to get teens interested and how to keep the teens once they come. 1. **TITLE: Starting, Running & Re-Energizing Your Reading Group.**

PRESENTER: **Tim Podell** of Tim Podell Productions.

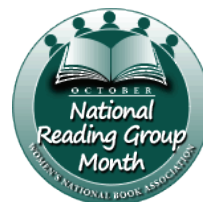

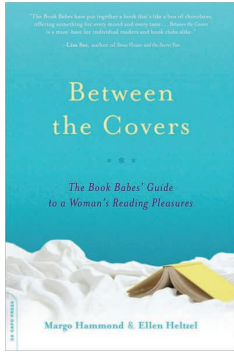

The Once and Future Reader: How Reading Groups Past and Present Have Kept Us Reading.

Margo Hammond is co-author of **Between the Covers: The Book Babes' Guide to a Woman's Reading Pleasure**. Seeking to nurture fellowship around the love

of books, Margo Hammond and Ellen Heltzel first teamed up as The Book Babes in 2002 to write a weekly column for Poynter Online. They have also written a weekly column for

the *Book Standard*, the sister online publication of *Kirkus Reviews*, a monthly column for the *Good Housekeeping Magazine* online, and articles for the *San Jose Mercury* and the *Minneapolis Star Tribune*. In 2007, they launched a monthly radio show with WMNF-FM in Tampa, FL. As solo acts or together, they have appeared on NBC's *Today Show* and C-SPAN's *Book TV*, and their work has appeared in magazines and newspapers across the country. Margo Hammond, former book editor for the *St. Petersburg Times*, has served as a National Book Critics Circle board member and as president of the Southern Book Critics Circle. She wrote a weekly travel column for *The New York Times Syndicate* and worked at *The Atlantic Monthly*, the *Washington Star*, and the *Baltimore Sun*. She lives in St. Petersburg, Florida.
